

It is a good review of the doctrinal and other background leading to Isreal performance. However, its conclusions continue the perspective of the Hezbollah and Hamas threat as "Hybrid" as defined by Frank Hoffman as opposed to being just a maturation of an insurgent force into a light infantry force. Thus, it indicates a discovery of the need for such traditional skills as combined arms operations and joint fires coordination.

Since the attacks of 9-11, published accounts of battles of insurgency and counterinsurgency have expanded dramatically. But few record the kinds of lessons that David Johnson highlights in his carefully and clearly written research, "Hard Fighting." Dr. Johnson's comparative analysis shows how the Israeli Defense Force (IDF) assessed its own performance in Second Lebanon War in 2006, found it lacking, and then dramatically adjusted strategy, policy, and doctrine with "Operation Cast Lead," in Gaza in December 2008. Johnson builds a theme for his book early on: the necessity to engage in hybrid warfare. In the first campaign, the IDF faced Hezbollah, a force that had

received "extensive training in Lebanon, Syria, and Iran, and learned how to blend guerilla tactics with conventional military tactics and weapons to create an innovative concept for defending southern Lebanon." In the second case, Operation Cast Lead, the IDF "was markedly better prepared to fight another hybrid opponent: Hamas." The adjustments by the IDF went so far as to re-direct training strategies for its reserve forces as well as to re-orient the force on to training for maneuver warfare. Dr. Johnson sets up a compelling case for the relationship between "levels" of adversaries: non-state irregular, state-sponsored hybrid, and state. Among the most important lessons for US forces, he writes, "The skills and processes needed to prevail against hybrid opponents are different in many respects from those required to conduct a counterinsurgency. They require highly integrated joint, combined-arms fire-and-maneuver skills used in major combat operations, but at lower organizational level (i.e., the brigade combat team level.)." There are other critical lessons that flow from this major finding. Dr. Johnson shows the striking feature of hybrid warfare: how terror organizations managed to develop sophisticated tactics of maneuver, with some credible technologies, to challenge a modern force inside its own schema of battle, showing that though one may think at first that his enemy does not resemble conventional army, it nonetheless is organized and deadly. This is a rare book. It holds concise yet detailed wisdom for both tactician and strategist. If asked to advise leaders about what they might read to learn about recent experiences in countering vague and hybrid threats, and they had time for only one book, I would advise them to carefully read this before deciding upon any training strategy. This would apply to active and reserve forces, to maneuver as well as staff functions.
